

# *The Paper Pulpit*

*(Reflections from the Pastor)*

## **3<sup>rd</sup> Sunday in Lent**

**Scripture:** In our gospel, Jesus meets a Samaritan woman at a well and asks her for a drink of water. Not even God could walk through the hot Galilean desert without becoming thirsty. This scene shows us a very human Jesus. No big miracle here; no casting out of devils, no miracle of turning sand into water. Just an ordinary meeting as we might encounter in our daily life. “Hi. How are you? Got any water?” But this ordinary occurrence shows us how Jesus evangelized. It shows us in miniature his whole life of preaching, discerning, reaching out, witnessing, calling people where they are, as they are. We could meditate on this gospel our whole life and have a whole method of witnessing and dealing with our brothers and sisters. This incident is priceless because it is so ordinary. And yet, as the oak in the acorn, in this incident we have all of how a Christian is to relate to others.

How about us? Do we have a mind to evangelize? Or better yet, do we have a mind to go out and see how many others we can help to know Jesus? This is a gospel of witnessing. How do we witness? Lent is a good time for us to practice our witnessing to others about what Jesus, our Lord and Savior, has done and is doing in our lives. A recent study said that 15% of Americans do not practice any religion. We all know a family member or friend who is not coming to weekly Mass. It also showed that most Catholics who return after being inactive did so because someone invited them back. The study showed that the best recruiters of inactive Church members were those who had once been inactive themselves. In other words, they were people like the woman in today's reading.

Who is one person you know to be inactive and whom you might invite back? How? If you or someone you know has fallen away from the faith, on behalf of St. Maximilian Kolbe Parish, I am inviting you/them back. Please pray for those who have fallen away from the faith and encourage them to come back home.
