
This Week

Sharing in Mary's Mission

In today's Gospel, we hear about what happened after the angel Gabriel had announced to Mary that she was chosen to be the Mother of the Son of God, and she agreed. In her culture, she could have been stoned to death for being pregnant and unmarried, yet she knows she has been given a special mission from God and so she responds in faith, reaching out to another who will understand her mission, as the angel told her. When she is called to serve the Lord, she moves to action; she and her cousin Elizabeth show us an example of different generations serving the same mission in different ways. Mary reminds us to be open to the movement of the Holy Spirit in our lives and respond with faith and trust in God.

We, too, can recognize the gift of faith as the greatest gift for difficult times. We are reminded not to get trapped in what we see, whether life difficulties or shiny material gifts, but reach out in faith to others and rejoice in relationships of loving support. We are reminded that Mary offers tender support to everyone who accepts their part in the mission of Christ, like Elizabeth did. Mary shows us the power of surrendering to God's will as a way to bring unexplainable joy!

- 3. Mary carried Jesus in her womb to Elizabeth. How are you called to make Jesus present at gatherings of your family, friends, or coworkers? How might you together with your family and friends bring the love and support of Jesus Christ to the poor and vulnerable?



For the Individual

For Couples

Visit with an elderly person or an elderly couple

Think of people on your street, or contact your local retirement center about a person or a couple that has no visitors. Agree on how you might bring this person/ couple joy and love of the coming Christ. Ask to visit. Spend time listening and rejoicing in the blessings of the perspective of an older generation.

For the Domestic Church

Prepare children and teens to act out the story of Christ's birth

Help them be imaginative in improvise with the supplies they can find in the house as they follow the story from Luke 2:1-20. When you gather with family and friends one of the parents read the story from the Bible as the children act. Have fun!

What Makes us Catholic?

People often discard Christmas trees only one day after Christmas. By Epiphany of the Lord on January 6th, barely anyone has the Christmas lights on. It is as if Christmas is over, but that is not how Catholics celebrate Christmas: we celebrate beginning with vigil Masses on Christmas Eve, December 24th and conclude on the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord, January 9th 2022. In most parts of the world, the tree remains until Epiphany or the "12th night" (January 6), which is where we get our "12 days of Christmas."

During this season, we celebrate the birth of Christ into our world and into our hearts and reflect on the gift of salvation that is born with him. He was born to die for us. LEARN MORE

Word of the Week - Maranatha

IAn Aramaic expression occurring in St. Paul (I Corinthians 16:22) in the verse "If anyone does not love the Lord, a curse on him. Maran atha." The Christian Fathers understood the term to mean "Our Lord has come." But more probably it means what St. John has at the close of the New Testament, "Come, Lord Jesus" (Revelation 22:20).
