
Making "God First" Choices

Modern life presents us with a dizzying amount of options and choices. There are many things we must do and many we want to do. Deciding which ones to say "no" to requires a heroic measure of discipline. To be successful, we must determine what we really want out of life, and consider what the outcome will be if we wander aimlessly--prey to every distraction--rather than choose deliberately.

The decision to form one's conscience and character in the faith of Jesus Christ cannot be one option among many. If we believe that Jesus Christ is Lord of our lives, then conforming ourselves to his likeness must always take precedence over everything else. If "God first" is not the default position, if God and the things of God are not given first priority, then the world will conform us to itself rather than to Christ. God then becomes and marginal figure (and much less relevant) in our lives. In today's society we see generations of grown-up children who have not learned to worship or to make life choices based on the teachings of Christ and his Church. We can continue down this path to our detriment, or we as individuals and as a people can make different choice.

Opening Prayer

CONNECT with our GOD

- Let's start with the <u>The Sign of Cross.</u>
- In your own words, ask the Holy Spirit to be present as we gather so share our faith (<u>Prayer to the Holy Spirit</u>).
- Listen to the Lord speaking to you as someone reads out load the Gospel for this Sunday (see previous page for links to Scripture readings for this week).
- Listen to each other as everyone shares what in the Gospel caught their attention.
- Pray the <u>"Glory be..."</u>

Step One

CONNECT with our daily LIVES

- 1. Name someone you know whom you believe lives or lived life with the right purpose? What is significant about his or her life that makes you believe this?
- 2. Have I discovered what is my purpose in life? How do I know? Share thoughts with one another.





CONNECT with Scripture and Tradition

In the HOLY SCRIPTURE we read about...

- In living the New Commandment, we take up our crosses and follow Jesus, so we find and live our purpose John 13:31–35, Matthew 16:24–26
- 'The three goals of our life's purpose are to know (John17: 3), love (Mark 12:29–31) and serve (Matthew 25:40) God
- ·We are sent to share and grow God's Kingdom Matthew 28:16-20

In the Catechism of the Catholic Church, we read:

- God made us to share in His own life, so only in Him we find true happiness #1 & #27
- ·God put us in the world to know, to love, and to serve him, and so to come to paradise. #1721
- The baptized in Christ are called to proclaim Him to the world. #1816

As a Domestic Church (your household) or Small Faith Group, pray and read through some of the suggested Scriptures & Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC) references

Discussion Questions

- 1. In today's Gospel, Jesus claims the mission for which God sent him--to proclaim the Word of God. Are you open to God's call in your life, no matter what form that may take? In what ways do you lean on Jesus to understand how your talents and gifts, loves and desires, capacities and responsibilities influence your life's purpose?
- 2.Today's Gospel shows us that familiar settings are often the most difficult for sharing the wisdom of Christ. How have you experienced this? Who are some people you have the most difficulty sharing faith with, and why? What could you do about it?

Reflection Question

How does Jesus' love for me help me to respond by seeking to know, love, and serve God? In what ways am I striving to know, love, and serve God in my life right now?

What is one thing you are willing to do allow Jesus Christ to help you discover and live your life's purpose? What is one thing you are willing to change with friends, at school or work, or in any encounter with another person, to express self-giving love of Jesus Christ?

Practical Activities

For the Individual

Practice Being and Everyday Prophet

Think of a short statement you might share with anyone that would teach them, or remind them of a simple truth about God. Then add this to your everyday vocabulary. For example: "God loves you!" at the end of your texts and emails, and any time you part from someone.

For Couples

Share a Glass of Wine and Make an Inventory of Your Love

Use 1 Corinthians 13 as a magnifying glass to discover how you might strengthen your love. You might enjoy leaning on each other back-to-back, so you reassure the other through the touch, but have no eye contact. It's useful to agree on uninterrupted time of sharing (3–5 minute). Sip your wine and practice patiently listening the other. Remember you are making an inventory of love, not a list of complaints.

For the Domestic Church

Enjoy a Scavenger Hunt for <u>Sacramentals</u>

Sacramentals remind us of God's love and presence in our everyday life and help us seek him. Have each child make a list of all sacramentals they might find in your home. (<u>Learn more.</u>) For even more fun, make it a competition. Enjoy your time together!

Missionary Mindset

Write an encouragement card to a family member who has stopped practicing the Faith Practice tender kindness as you focus on what unite you rather than what keeps you apart. Don't forget to tell them that the Church misses them and prays for them every day.

Closing Prayer

- We sign ourselves with the Sign of Cross.
- According to what we reflected on, or whatever is in my heart share a petition, at the end we all say: *Lord hear our prayer.*
- Then we can pray the Our Father, Hail Mary and the Glory be...
- As we finish, let us share a sing of peace with each other.

What Makes us Catholic?

On February 2nd Catholics celebrate the Feast of The Presentation of the Lord, known in secular society as "Groundhog Day" (due to a combination of many traditions over the centuries). In obedience to the Old Law, the Lord Jesus, the first-born, was presented in the Temple by St. Joseph and his Blessed Mother. This is another 'epiphany' celebration insofar as the Christ Child is revealed as the Messiah through the canticle and words of Simeon and the testimony of Anna the prophetess (Luke 2: 22–40).
