It's no secret: you can learn how to pray!


Praying. Most of us could use a little help with our prayer life. As we approach Lent, it's probably the best thing we can do during the Lenten season so we can do all other things well. Yet becoming a person of prayer is something many people struggle with, sometimes because they don't know how to pray, or can't seem to find the time, or don't realize that it's just not that difficult. In what ways do you struggle to pray, or to pray more faithfully? Here I share the words of Mike Stapp who lives near Boston:

"Even if you've got a houseful of screaming kids, or too much schoolwork, or a job that consumes way too much of your time. In fact, that just means that you need prayer more! Because prayer gives true **freedom**, "the glorious freedom of the children of God" (Rom 8:21). And that's exactly what you need right about now, isn't it? It's what we all need?"

CONNECT with our GOD


- Let's start with the <u>The Sign of Cross.</u>

CONNECT with Scripture and Tradition

In the HOLY SCRIPTURE we read about...

- By prayer, we seek to know Christ. This is our ultimate goal. Philippians 3:9-11 Through prayer, we know the love of Christ that surpasses all knowledge. Ephesians 3:14-19.
- When you call me, and come and pray to me, I will listen to you. (Jeremiah 29:12)
- When you look for me, you will find me. Yes, when you seek me with all your heart (<u>Jeremiah 29:13</u>).

In the Catechism of the Catholic Church, we read:

- ...it is most important that the heart should be present to him to whom we are speaking in prayer (<u>CCC #2700</u>)
- The Church invites the faithful to regular prayer: daily prayers, the Liturgy of the Hours, Sunday Eucharist, the feasts of the liturgical year (CCC #2720).



Practical Activities

For the Individual

Tie Some Knots

Make a simple cross and tie onto it a long cord or piece of string. Each time you notice God helping you through a difficult time or giving you something good, offer a prayer of thanks and tie a knot in the cord. See how long it takes you (and God!) to get to the end!

For Couples

Targeted Prayer for Your Spouse

Pray for your spouse, that God may put in his or her path the people (besides you) that your spouse needs to live a fulfilling life and grow in holiness. Pray that others may help your spouse become the person he/she was created to be, especially in those areas where you alone cannot be everything to your spouse. Pray for good friends, good mentors, good pastors and other good people to enter into your spouse's life.

Missionary Mindset

Pray to End Violence and Help People Know Jesus

Pray for those who are suffering from violence and war around the world. Pray also for those who are working to share the Good News about Jesus with those who do not know him. As you pray and go about your day, look for ways to be less violent, less angry and more kind to others. Look for ways to show the love of Jesus to others.

Closing Prayer

What Makes us Catholic?

A Catholic has a heart fixed on Jesus Christ as savior, Lord, and friend. A Catholic disciple follows Jesus so closely that Jesus is the first priority, the center of one's life, because that person has experienced the Risen-Crucified and Glorified Lord who gave His all on the Cross, who continues to give his all in the Eucharist. Jesus calls each disciple into a deep, intimate relationship, establishing an eternal bond with him. Jesus has commanded that we be committed to each other in the same way his committed to us in the Catholic Church: a communion of love between God and his people. Just as Jesus sent out the twelve apostles, he also sends us at the end of every Mass, to be his presence in the world by what we say and do. Jesus desires that we be his voice calling all people to himself and back home to the Father. All of this is possible by the power of the Holy Spirit who is at work in each member of the Church. God compassionately seeks each of us out to save us from sin to experience his never-ending lavish love.

Word of the Week - Prayer

There are many ways to define prayer. The *Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC)* defines prayer as a "vital and personal relationship with the living and true God" (CCC, no. 2558). Prayer is Christian "is communion with Christ" (CCC, no. 2565), and a "covenant relationship between God and man in Christ" (CCC, no. 2564). Basically, prayer is both a relationship with God and a way to strengthen that relationship. This we cannot do on our own, but God is always ready and willing to help us!
