

This Week

Divine Mercy Sunday


From Creation, God has revealed his nature as love itself, in Sacred Scripture and most perfectly in the life, Passion, death and Resurrection of his Son, Jesus.

Mankind's need for the message of Divine Mercy took on dire urgency in the 20th Century, when civilization began to experience an "eclipse of the sense of God" and, therefore to lose the understanding of the sanctity and inherent dignity of human life. In the 1930s, Jesus chose a humble Polish Nun, St. Maria Faustina Kowalska, to receive private revelations concerning Divine Mercy that were recorded in her Diary.

On May 5, 2000, five days after the canonization of St. Faustina, the Vatican decreed that the Second Sunday of Easter would henceforth be known as Divine Mercy Sunday. In his second encyclical, *Rich in Mercy*, Pope Saint John Paul II offers an extended meditation on the mystery of God's mercy, which he calls "the greatest of the attributes and perfections of God" (*Dives in misericordia*, 13). Pope Benedict XVI called St. John Paul II "a great apostle of Divine Mercy" and said that: Mercy is the central nucleus of the Gospel message; it is the very name of God, On this Guide we are goint to be reflecting on God's abundant and merciful love to us.

Question of the Week

Opening Prayer

CONNECT with our GOD

- Let's start with the <u>The Sign of Cross.</u>
- In your own words, ask the Holy Spirit to be present as we gather so share our faith (<u>Prayer to the Holy Spirit</u>).
- Listen to the Lord speaking to you as someone reads out loud the Gospel for this Sunday (see previous page for links to Scripture readings for this week).
- Listen to each other as everyone shares what in the Gospel caught their attention.
- Pray the <u>"Glory be..."</u>

Step One

CONNECT with our daily LIVES

- In this Sunday's gospel, Thomas doubted about Jesus being risen from the dead. Have you ever doubted about your faith or some aspects of it? If so, which ones and explain.
- How is mercy and forgiveness portrayed in popular culture? Is it a sign of weakness or of strength? Why do you think this is?

Step Two
CONNECT with Scripture and Tradition

As a domestic church (your household) or Small Faith Group, pray and read through some of the following (you can select) Scriptures & Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC) references as time permits.

In the HOLY SCRIPTURE we read:

- God is always merciful with us. Wisdom 11:24-26
- God is merciful and loving always looking out for us.. 2 Chronicles 30:9
- A beatitude for those who are mercyful. Matthew 5, 7
- God's mercy is a gift. Exodus 33:19

In the Catechism of the Catholic Church, we read:

- In the Sacrament of Reconciliation we experience God's Mercy. CCC # 1422
- Christ will is for us to be mercyful to others. CCC #2100
- Mary, "Mother of Mercy". CCC #2677
- Works of mercy are necesary. CCC #1473

Discussion Questions

- 1. What are the "doors" in my life that I keep "closed" because of fear or sadness that Jesus wants to go through to bring me comfort and peace?
- 2. When I have doubts, what or who helps me regain faith and trust in my life?
- 3. Have I experienced the merciful love of God in my life? What was that experience like? Share it.

Practical Activities

For the Individual - Do not be afraid to be like Thomas

Find someone who may need to hear the story of your faith journey. Don't be afraid to identify with Thomas!

For Couples - Share your faith story with your spouse

Share with your spouse your very own faith story; your first experiences with Christ and how He has been taking you through moments of fear and doubt, giving you comfort and peace and showing you his Mercy. At the end do a thanksgiving prayer together.

For the Domestic Church and beyond - Sharing our Faith Stories

Host a gathering in your home with family, friends or acquaintances where anyone who is ready and willing, can share their faith story. Encourage those present to listen carefully and try to find some connection between what others share and their own stories of faith.

Closing Prayer

- We sign ourselves with the Sign of Cross.
- According to what we reflected on, or whatever is in my heart share a petition, at the end we all say: *Lord hear our prayer.*
- Then we can pray the Our Father, Hail Mary and the Glory be...
- As we finish, let us share a sign of peace with each other.

DIVINE MERCY CHAPLET

Because of Jesus' Passion, I beg, Father, that You shower Your great mercy upon the whole world, upon the souls in purgatory, and upon my own soul.

OPENING PRAYERS:

You expired, Jesus, but the Source of Life gushed forth for souls, and the Ocean of Mercy opened for the whole world. O Fount of Life, unfathomable Divine Mercy, envelop the whole world, and empty Yourself out upon us.

PRAY 3 TIMES:

Oh, Blood and Water, which gushed forth from the Heart of Jesus as a Fountain of Mercy for us, I trust in You!

PRAY: OUR FATHER, HAIL MARY, APOSTLES' CREED.

AT THE START OF EACH DECADE:

Eternal Father, I offer You the Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity of Your Dearly Beloved Son, Our Lord, Jesus Christ, In atonement for our sins and those of the whole world.

PRAY 10 TIMES:

For the sake of His sorrowful Passion, Have mercy on us and on the whole world.

AFTER 5 DECADES, PRAY 3 TIMES:

Holy God, Holy Mighty One, Holy Immortal One, Have mercy on us and on the whole world.

CLOSING PRAYERS:

Eternal God, in Whom mercy is endless and the treasury of compassion inexhaustible, look kindly upon us and increase your mercy in us, that in difficult moments we might not despair nor become despondent, but with great confidence submit ourselves to Your Holy Will, which is Love and Mercy itself.

PRAY 3 TIMES:

Jesus, I trust in You!

PRAY ONCE: St. Faustina, Pray for us!

Fill me now, O Lord, with the gift of the Holy Spirit to carry Your most Holy Word to sinners who I must help save in Your Name. Help me to cover them, through my prayers, with Your Precious Blood so that they can be drawn to Your Sacred Heart. Give me the gift of the Holy Spirit so that these poor souls can revel in Your New Paradise. Amen.

Divine Mercy Sunday

Devotion to Jesus as the Divine Mercy is part of popular piety and devotion among Catholics Popular piety is a sign that the faith is spreading its roots into the heart of a people in such a way that it reaches into daily life. Popular religiosity is the first and fundamental mode of "inculturation" of the faith. While it must always take its lead and direction from the liturgy, it in turn enriches the faith by involving the heart.

Nine Things to Know about Divine Mercy Sunday

Word of the Week - MERCY

The word 'mercy' comes from the Latin misericordia, which comes from the two words miseria, meaning wretchedness, misery or affliction, and cor, meaning heart. Etymologically "mercy" means a heart for the misery or affliction of another; it means compassion or pity. "Mercy includes showing kindness to those who don't deserve it and forgiving those that deserve punishment." Mercy is one of the defining characteristics of God. Exodus 34:6 says: "The Lord, the Lord, a God merciful and gracious, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love and faithfulness."


