




This Week

"Love one another. As I have loved you"

This Sunday Jesus delivers his farewell address. We will hear in the second part of the Gospel of St. John the invitation he makes to his disciples to love one another in a new and challenging way... "as he has loved them." The question that immediately arises is how Jesus has loved us, and the answer we all know, TO THE EXTREME, to the last consequences, he laid down his own life for each one of us to reconcile us with God, the Father and by doing so, he opened the doors to heaven for us. The farewell address in the Gospel of John extends from chapter 13 to 17. Jesus is very clear that "The Hour" has come to him and He does not refer to "chronos" (measurable time), but to "Kayros" (time of God); to complete his mission, to suffer, die and rise from the dead. It is very strange, but often when a person is going to die, it is as if the person knows, even when he/she is not seriously ill. Oftentimes the person begins to say goodbye or gives important advice, gathers the family, etc. What is true is that the person does not waste his/her words, what they say is often very important and profound. They may ask for forgiveness, or they bless everyone, or they may ask that whoever needs to, reconcile, among other things. Jesus knows that his HOUR has arrived and the teaching we hear in the gospel has this tone, one of utmost importance. Loving one another is essential and fundamental in the Christian life and the challenge is even greater because Jesus invites us to love as He did. May God grant us the grace of longing and seeking to love everyone around us, as Jesus does.

Opening Prayer

Step One

CONNECT with our daily LIVES

When and by whom have you felt deeply loved, accepted and valued? Share!

Using this Guide can be as simple or as "in depth" as you want. If you do only the opening prayer section, that's great! To go deeper, follow the steps as shown. For children, see "Resources," page 8.

Step Two

CONNECT with Scripture and Tradition

As a domestic church (your household) or Small Faith Group, pray and read through some of the following (you can select) Scriptures & Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC) references as time permits.

In the HOLY SCRIPTURE we read:

- The New Law resumes in this: Believe in Jesus Christ and love one another as He has loved us. 1 John
 3:23
- This is the new commandment: Whoever loves God, loves his neighbor as well. 1 John 4:21.
- This is the kind of love that God expects from us. Isaiah 58: 6-7

In the Catechism of the Catholic Church, we read:

- Christ's Love, charity, the New Commandment: CCC #1823
- Christ dies out of love for us: CCC #1825
- Love to our neighbor is inseparable from the love of God: CCC #1878

Discussion Questions

- In what way does the Eucharist deeply unite us with our triune God and with our neighbor?
- What relationships in my life are centered around my relationship with God? How does this affect those relationships?

Reflection Question

Perhaps many people in our community or our neighborhood are aware that we attend the Catholic Church. How do we show them that we are disciples of Jesus? How do we show love for each other, both in our community and in other communities?

As a family, read or watch a video about the life story of Mother Teresa, Dorothy Day or someone else who during their lifetime, committed to making changes in the area of social justice. Take a moment and reflect on how he or she lived the commandment to "love one another."


Missionary Mindset

Closing Prayer

- We sign ourselves with the Sign of Cross.

- Then we can pray the Our Father, Hail Mary and the Glory be...
- As we finish, let us share a sign of peace with each other.



What Makes us Catholic?

A richness from our catholic faith are the Saints... on the commandment we hear today: love one another as I have love you.

Dorothy Day is an amazing example of how to live it.

<u>Dorothy Day</u> (8 November 1897 – 29 November 1980) was an American journalist turned social activist. A pacifist and a devout member of the Catholic Church, she advocated distributism and was a co-founder, with Peter Maurin, of the Catholic Worker movement. She authored several books and spoke often in public about faith and social justice.

Word of the Week - KAYROS = GOD'S "TIME"

Kairos is an ancient Greek word meaning 'the right, critical, or opportune moment'. In the Bible it refers to an "opportune presentation" in rhetoric and a "spiritual opportunity". In John's Gospel Jesus uses the term "the hour" to refer to this opportune moment when something big is about to be revealed or manifested.
