

This Week

"My peace I give to you"


In today's gospel (John 14:23–29), Jesus says, "Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. Not as the world gives do I give it to you. Do not let your hearts be troubled or afraid." In today's world, there are plenty of reasons to be "troubled and afraid," yet Jesus says to us: "Peace." The world gives us every reason to panic, to be fearful, to doubt and give up hope. Jesus gives us one reason to be at peace: that he has sent us the Holy Spirit, as he promised, to help us believe and to keep his word as he commands us. Being at "peace" does not mean being ignorant of life's difficulties and pain, or to pretend they do not exist; instead, peace is the state of knowing that God is with us through our sufferings and love conquers all evil. True peace is a gift of Christ's death and resurrection.

After we pray the "Our Father" at Mass, the priest prays: "Deliver us, Lord, we pray, from every evil, graciously grant peace in our days, that, by the help of your mercy, we may be always free from sin and safe from all distress, as we await the blessed hope and the coming of our Savior, Jesus Christ." Here we pray that God keep us "safe from distress"—that is, anything that weakens our faith so much that we cannot stay focused on God. When we offer one another the Sign of Peace at Mass, we are doing more than saying hello or wishing one another well. In fact, it is a profession of faith: as Christ's disciples, we believe that the soul–soothing peace he offers is ours, and that this is enough to sustain us through this life as we strive to love him and keep his commandments. This is possible only through the Holy Spirit, given to us at our baptism.

CONNECT with our GOD


- Let's start with the <u>The Sign of Cross.</u>

- Listen to the Lord speaking to you as someone reads out loud the Gospel for this Sunday (see previous page for links to Scripture readings for this week).
- Listen to each other as everyone shares what in the Gospel caught their attention.
- Pray the <u>"Glory be..."</u>



Step One

CONNECT with our daily LIVES

- 1. Explain what you think "peace" means.
- 2. Jesus tells us, "Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. Not as the world gives do I give it to you" (John 14:27). What do you think is different about the peace Jesus gives us? Why do you think that is so?





Using this Guide can be as simple or as "in depth" as you want. If you do only the opening prayer section, that's great! To go deeper, follow the steps as shown. For children, see "Resources," page 8.

Step Two
CONNECT with Scripture and Tradition

As a domestic church (your household) or Small Faith Group, pray and read through some of the following (you can select) Scriptures & Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC) references as time permits.

In the HOLY SCRIPTURE we read:

- Jesus is our peace. Ephesians 2:14
- "I will fear no evil, for you are with me" Psalm 23:4
- Seven hundred of years before Jesus was born into this world, the prophet Isaiah called him the "Prince of Peace." <u>Isaiah 9:6</u>

In the Catechism of the Catholic Church, we read:

- Earthly peace is the image and fruit of the peace of Christ, the messianic "Prince of Peace." #2305
- Jesus asks for childlike abandonment to the providence of our heavenly Father who takes care of his children's smallest needs. #305
- Peace is the work of justice and the effect of charity. #2304

Discussion Questions

- 1. What are some causes of anxiety, worry, distress and fear in today's society? Name some healthy and unhealthy ways people cope with distress.
- 2. Jesus gives us peace no matter what the situation we are in. It is an inner peace that comes from trust in God. Can you think of someone you know who trusts God? How do you think trusting in God helps us not to worry or be afraid? (See "Saints of the Month" on page 11.)
- 3. What are some reasons for hope as we see Jesus Christ present in our lives? How does the Holy Spirit help us overcome fear and worry?

- 1. In what ways am I currently "troubled and afraid" in my life? In what ways is Jesus asking me to trust in him and accept the peace he offers?

Practical Activities

For the Individual

Bring Christ's Peace to Your Heart

To bring Christ's peace to others, we must recognize that he is with us, he loves us, an he thinks we are worthy to be loved. Jesus gives us peace—not because we have earned it or deserve it, but because his is full of mercy and wants to be in relationship with each one of us. Claim this peace by thanking God and asking the Holy Spirit to help you trust God more.

For Couples

Bring Christ's Peace to Your Marriage

Harsh words, rudeness, lack of empathy, contempt, selfishness, plotting revenge...these things do not come from God. This week, choose to bring peace to your relationship by replacing something negative with something good. It could simply mean showing a little more gratitude or affection. Let your spouse know that he/she is not alone in their troubles.

For the Domestic Church

Bring Christ's Peace to Your Household

At Mass, the deacon or priest says, "Let us offer each other a sign of peace." What sign of peace can you give at home? Maybe it's not always having to be right or get your way. Maybe it's avoiding an argument or being a little more understanding.

Missionary Mindset

Bring Christ's Peace to Others at Mass

Be sincere with the Sign of Peace at Mass. Be willing to extend this blessing to others in a way that is honest and heartfelt. It may be difficult to do this when we do not personally know the people sitting around us, but this is not a popularity contest. We may be strangers to some in this world, but because we are baptized Christians, there are no real strangers among us. We want to help one another experience the peace of Christ in each other and in the world.

Closing Prayer

- We sign ourselves with the Sign of Cross.
- According to what we reflected on, or whatever is in my heart share a petition, at the end we all say: *Lord hear our prayer.*
- Then we can pray the Our Father, Hail Mary and the Glory be...
- As we finish, let us share a sign of peace with each other.

PRAYER

The following prayer is called the *Embolism*. At Mass, the priest offers this prayer immediately after the assembly together prays The Lord's Prayer. It develops the last petition of the Lord's Prayer itself, asks for deliverance from the power of evil for the whole community of the faithful. It is based upon the New Testament book of Titus (2:13) which says, "...as we await the blessed hope, the appearance of the glory of the great God and of our Savior, Jesus Christ, who gave himself for us to deliver us from all lawlessness and to cleanse for himself a people as his own, eager to do what is good."

(Ref. General Instruction on the Roman Missal #81.)

Deliver us, Lord, we pray, from every evil, graciously grant peace in our days, that, by the help of Your mercy, we may be always free from sin and safe from all distress, as we await the blessed hope and the coming of our Savior, Jesus Christ. People: For the kingdom, the power and the glory are Yours now and forever.





What Makes us Catholic?

The Hebrew word for "peace" is shalom (שׁלּוֹם). It means much more than a friendly greeting. Shalom refers to complete peace: a state of contentment, completeness, wholeness, and harmony. More than the absence of war, it suggests an orderly, prosperous, and tranquil state of affairs. It contains the Hebrew notion of shelemut, or perfection. When Christians pray "Thy Kingdom come"—we are praying for a mode of being in which all things are healed and restored to their proper order in God in whose divine presence we receive grace and redemption, and restoration. This is true peace.

When we offer the Sign of Peace at Mass, we are making a profession of faith that such a thing is possible, and that we are committed to living our lives in such a way that this complete peace will become a reality. Thus, Shalom also points to a moral value to which we commit ourselves; we desire to cooperate with God to bring a world in which shalom is not merely a wish but a reality. The pursuit of peace is the obligation of all of us. May we strive for this peace always.

HOW HAVE YOU SEEN GOD PRESENT AND ACTIVE IN YOUR LIFE THIS WEEK?

Word of the Week - Shalom

Shalom signifies "peace"—the kind of deep peace that is more than the absence of fighting (see "What Makes us Catholic" above). Shalom is a also a blessing, willing or desiring peace upon others, as found in Numbers 6:24–26, The LORD bless you and keep you. The Lord make His face shine upon you and be gracious to you. The LORD lift up His face upon you and give you SHALOM." (See above: "What Makes us Catholic?")
